## Step 4: Finalize with your school counselor (January 22 ${ }^{\text {nd }}$ - February 23 ${ }^{\text {rd }}$ )

> Meet with your school counselor during your assigned Math period to finalize your course selections.
> Please have your course request entered into StudentVue prior to your meeting with your counselor.
$>$ Give careful consideration to your selections since some of these options may not be available to you if you do not request them during the course selection period.

## Step 5: Verify (May $13^{\text {th }}-$ May $24^{\text {th }}$ )

$>$ Contact your counselor for elective changes by May 24th! Level change requests MUST go through the Dept. chair.
$>$ Staffing and sectioning decisions were based on your original course selections so changes are NOT GUARANTEED and will be processed on A SPACE AVAILABLE BASIS OVER THE SUMMER.
> Schedules will be viewable through StudentVue in mid-August.

## Note: Late Arrival \& Early Dismissal

$>$ Seniors must verify with their school counselor that they are on track to meet high school graduation and college entrance requirements before selecting an early dismissal or late arrival.
$>$ Seniors are encouraged to maximize their course exploration at Waubonsie Valley before selecting late arrival or early dismissal. High school courses provide valuable experiences leading to future opportunities.
$>$ Seniors must maintain full time status ( 3.0 credits per semester) to be eligible for graduation. A student who enrolls in late arrival or early dismissal will not be permitted to drop an additional course during the school year.
$>$ Completed application required. Students will be scheduled for study hall until application received and approved.
